a word (other than a pronoun) used to identify any of a class of people, places, or things (common noun), or to name a particular one of these (proper noun).

Clear? Maybe. It's about the key things in a sentence. It's about who or what the sentence is about. Nouns are the names of things and people and places. Bear is a noun; cake is a noun; bun is a noun; jam is a noun; marmalade is a noun – all the best things are nouns. ©
